

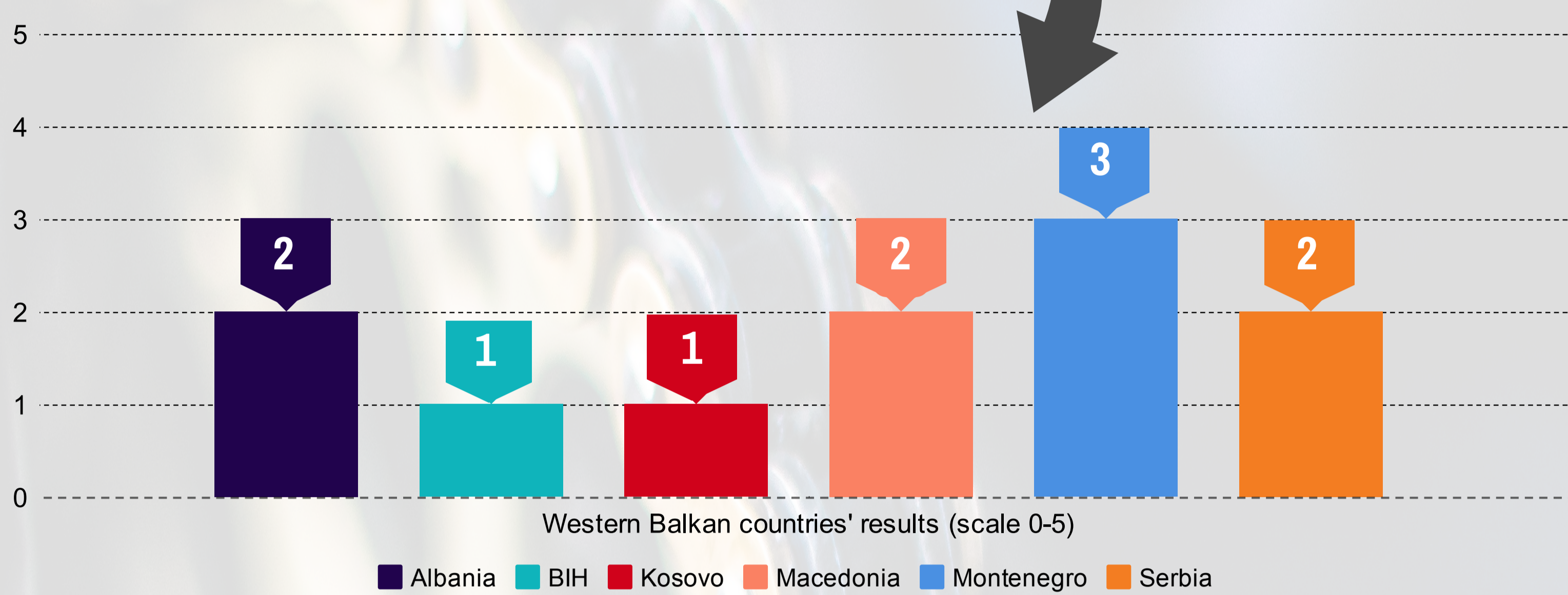


STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION REFORM

WeBER measures...

use of participatory approaches in the development of key strategic PAR documents.



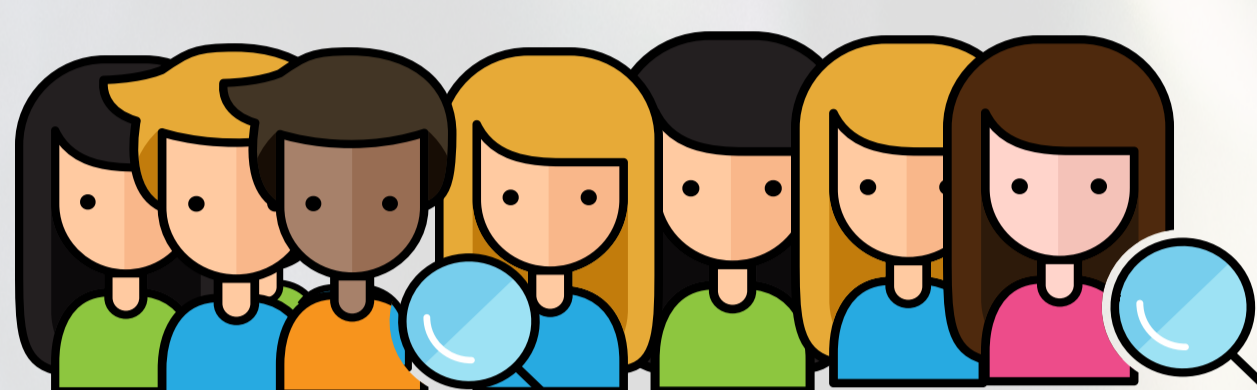
Civil society is rarely involved in the early stages of PAR documents' development.

Notable exceptions:



(only for developing central PAR strategies or their action plans)

Instead, governments usually organise short consultative meetings towards the end of the drafting process.

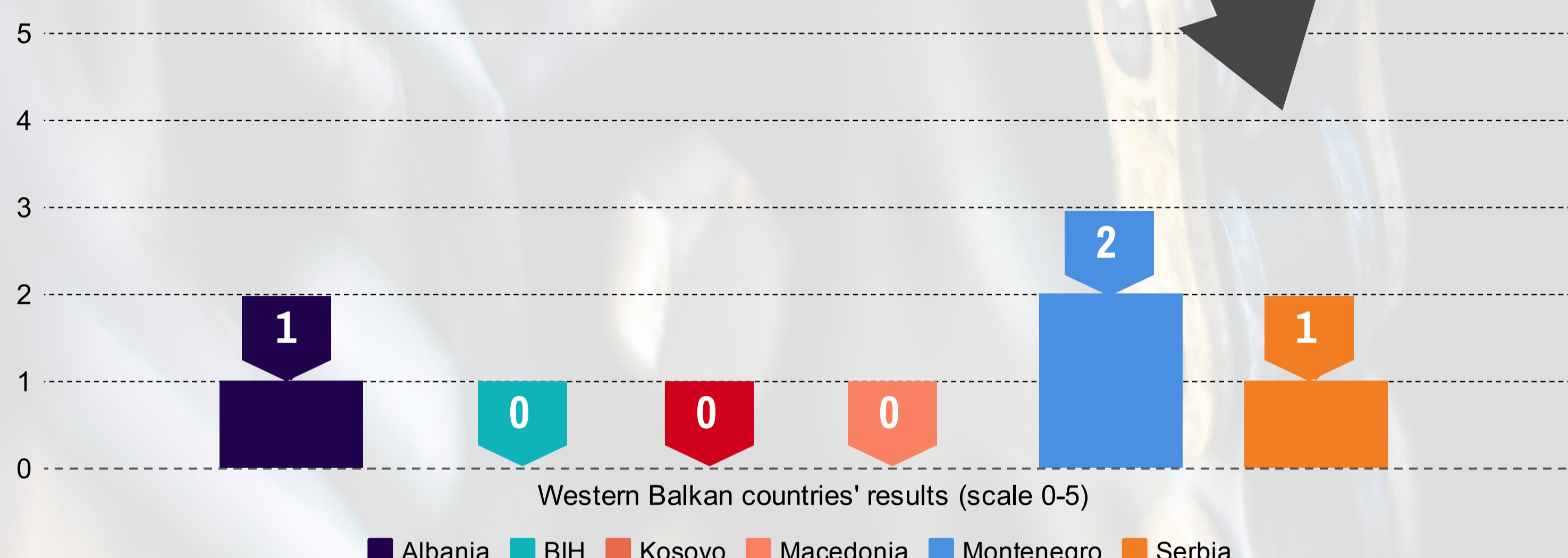
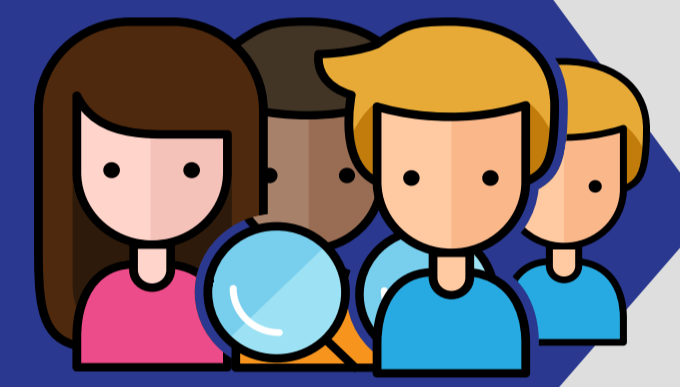


What do consultation practices in the Western Balkans lack?

- transparent feedback to the consultees
- purposive engagement of diverse stakeholder groups (particularly gender and disability groups)
- keeping and publishing documentation on the consultation process

WeBER measures...

civil society involvement in the PAR monitoring and coordination structures.



Participation of civil society organisations in the governmental monitoring and coordination structures for PAR is an exception rather than a standard in the Western Balkans!

The only two cases where CSOs have been included:



MONTENEGRO - political level structure



SERBIA - administrative level structure

Meetings of the coordination body involving CSOs have been irregular, which diminishes effective participation of civil society.

In **ALBANIA**, although participation of CSOs is envisaged for both administrative and political PAR coordination structures, **WeBER did not find evidence** of this being implemented in practice.

Underdeveloped policy monitoring and coordination practices in the Western Balkans are one of the reasons for poor involvement of CSOs in PAR. There is also a lack of recognition that the civil society can substantively contribute at the policy implementation stage.
